	<p><b>Dr. Eric Brown</b></p> <p>Eric Brown is senior research scientist at William &amp; Mary's Global Research Institute (GRI), where he studies world politics, Asia, history and alternative futures, and statecraft. Brown is also director of research for the Robert M. Gates Global Policy Center, which was established by former Secretary of Defense Gates to reimagine, restructure, and revitalize the U.S.'s non-military instruments of power. At W&amp;M since 2022, Brown writes and teaches on U.S.-China relations, India, the Indo-Pacific, the Global South, on international history and world futures, and on American statecraft. He is also faculty director of the GeoTech Initiative and co-director of Statecraft Simulations Group. From 2004-2024, Brown was a senior fellow at Hudson Institute. There, he led research and analysis and completed many assessments on China, Asia, the Middle East, alternative futures, and strategy. He has published widely and has conducted research across Eurasia and parts of Africa on security, diplomacy, development and other issues. In 2018, he was senior advisor to the congressionally mandated Task Force on Extremism and State Fragility. Brown is a Trustee of the American University of Iraq, Sulaimani.</p>
