On May 15, India's External Affairs Minister, Dr. S. Jaishankar, engaged in a <u>telephonic discussion</u> with the Taliban's Acting Foreign Minister, Mawlawi Amir Khan Muttaqi. The clear condemnation of the Pahalgam terrorist attack by the Taliban administration in Afghanistan received appreciative acknowledgement from Dr. Jaishankar. The Pakistani military's spokesperson previously alleged that India had conducted attacks on Afghan soil, a claim that <u>Afghan</u> and Indian officials unequivocally refuted. EAM Dr. Jaishankar, in this context, recognised Acting FM Muttaqi's strong dismissal of efforts to generate distrust between India and Afghanistan by disseminating false and unsubstantiated information. Later, as a special measure, <u>India authorised</u> the entry of 160 Afghan trucks carrying dried fruits and nuts via the Attari border. The Taliban's Ministry of Refugees and Repatriation issued a statement on May 20th, reporting that the Indian government had provided <u>food aid</u> to 5,000 Afghan individuals repatriated from Pakistan.

A fifteen-member Chinese <u>delegation</u>, led by Vice Chairman Xiao Jie of the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress, conducted a visit to Nepal between May 14 and 18. The delegation engaged <u>in discussions</u> with several key figures, including Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli, Speaker of the House of Representatives Devraj Ghimire, and Chairperson of the National Assembly Narayan Prasad Dahal. The delegation attended the Sagarmatha Sambaad conference and toured significant cultural and historical landmarks in the Kathmandu Valley.

On May 17th, India <u>initiated restrictions</u> on the land-based import of certain Bangladeshi products. The imposition of these restrictions followed Bangladesh's restriction of Indian cotton imports through seaports, resulting in the closure of land ports. The notification stipulates that all ready-made garments (RMG) imports from Bangladesh are prohibited via land ports; seaport entry is permitted solely through Nhava Sheva and Kolkata. This step is anticipated to significantly affect trade, given that Bangladesh's annual readymade garment exports to India, valued at approximately <u>USD 700 million</u>, predominantly utilize land ports (93%). The restrictions will not apply to Bangladeshi goods transiting through India to Bhutan and Nepal.

From May 21 to June 5, India will send <u>all-party delegations</u> to update partner countries on Operation Sindoor. Fifty-one political leaders comprise the



delegations briefing <u>thirty-two countries</u> and the European Union. All Permanent Five (P5) countries, with the exception of China, will be visited. The delegations will convey India's unified national position and steadfast resolve in confronting terrorism in all its manifestations.

Making Jakarta as his first overseas visit of his second term, newly re-elected Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese <u>arrived in Indonesia on May 14</u> for a three-day visit. On May 15, the President of the Republic of Indonesia, Prabowo Subianto, and the Prime Minister Anthony Albanese MP, met for the Indonesia-Australia Annual Leaders' Meeting. Following the meeting, a <u>2025</u> <u>Annual Leaders' Meeting Joint Communique</u> was released. Major issues discussed included the Indo-Pacific, wherein the two leaders reaffirmed the importance of working together to promote an Indo-Pacific region that is peaceful, stable, prosperous and rules-based with ASEAN at its centre that upholds international law.

On May 19, Indonesian President Prabowo Subianto commenced a series of official visits in Thailand, marking the first state visit by an Indonesian president in 20 years. President Prabowo held a meeting with King of Thailand Maha Vajiralongkorn Thailand and Queen of Suthida Bajrasudhabimalalakshana, where the leaders reiterated their commitment to enhancing collaborations in various strategic field. In the bilateral meeting between Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra and President Parabowo, the leaders agreed to elevate their relationship to a strategic partnership. In a statement by Prime Minister Paetongtarn, she said "The decision to elevate the two countries' relations to strategic partnership reflects our shared commitment to strengthen cooperation in several aspects on issues of mutual interest to the people of both countries." She also said that Thai and Indonesian police will strengthen cooperation in suppressing transnational crimes, especially online scams, human trafficking and drug trafficking.

Five days after he suffered a striking setback in the country's midterm elections, Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. finally admitted that his candidates for the Senate could have "performed better" with only securing 5 seats. On May 17, President Marcos "We all wish we had better results. But we live to fight another day". He added that "It's time to put all of the issues that were raised during the elections and only talk about not political issues but developmental issues -- health care issues, education issues, agricultural issues, supply issues, all of these things."

On May 17, China's state broadcaster <u>CCTV reported that the construction of</u> the Mohmand Hydropower Project in Pakistan has entered an accelerated phase. The state-owned China Energy Engineering Corporation, which holds the construction contract for the dam, has begun concrete filling at the site. Launched in September 2019, the project was originally scheduled for completion in 2026 but is now targeted for delivery in 2025. This development comes amid recent escalation between India and Pakistan following a deadly terrorist attack in Kashmir. India responded by suspending the 1960 Indus Waters Treaty, which governs water sharing between the two countries, along with other retaliatory measures.

Taiwan's <u>Ministry of National Defence (MND) reported that on May 20, it had</u> <u>detected six People's Liberation Army (PLA) aircraft, eight People's Liberation</u> <u>Army Navy (PLAN) vessels</u>, and three official Chinese ships operating in the vicinity of Taiwan. In the post on X, the MND noted that six of the PLA aircraft had crossed the median line of the Taiwan Strait, entering Taiwan's southwestern and eastern air defence identification zone (ADIZ). Taiwan authorities have been monitoring the situation, and their armed forces have deployed aircraft, naval vessels, and coastal missile systems.

Meanwhile, <u>Taiwan's President Lai Ching-te, in a press conference on the first</u> <u>anniversary of his presidency, reiterated his commitment to peace</u>. He stated that war has no winners and that Taiwan is open to dialogue with China based on "reciprocal dignity" and replacing of confrontation with constructive exchanges. China responded, voicing its willingness to engage in peaceful talks with Taiwan on the condition of adherence to the 'One China' principle. A Chinese government spokesperson, however, condemned Lai for escalating cross-Strait tensions and pursuing Taiwan independence for partisan gain.

North Korean leader <u>Kim Jong Un on May 17 supervised anti-aircraft combat</u> and air strike drills by North Korea's first Air Division, and called all military units to accelerate war preparations, according to state media. The drills featured a MiG-29 firing what is believed to be a North Korean version of a Russian air-to-air missile. The current month alone, Kim has overseen a missile test, inspected tank and munitions plants, and made a rare visit to the Russian embassy in Pyongyang. A South Korean news agency reported North Korea's



condemnation of the US for again placing it on a list of nations not fully cooperating with counterterrorism efforts, warning of escalating hostility.

US President Donald Trump <u>concluded his visit to the Middle East</u> (Saudi Arabia, Qatar, and the UAE) on May 16. During the visit, the US deepened its partnership with Qatar with USD 1.2 trillion "economic exchange"; Saudi Arabia promised to invest USD 600 billion in the US; and a number of key projects were signed with the UAE, after its commitment to a ten-year, USD 1.4 trillion investment framework in the US. According to analysts, Gulf nations' engagement with President Trump demonstrates their desire to work with the US across business, defence, and high-technology sectors.

As Hamas refused to agree to a new hostage deal with Israel, the Israel Defence Forces launched the <u>"Gideon's Chariots" ground operation</u> in Gaza on May 17. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu pledged to take <u>control of all of</u> <u>Gaza strip</u> if Hamas does not release the remaining hostages. He reiterated the need for Hamas to lay down its arms, exile its leaders, and demilitarise Gaza. The leaders of <u>Britain</u>, <u>France</u>, and <u>Canada rejected Israel's escalation</u> as "egregious" and promised a concrete response if Israel does not end the renewed offensive in Gaza. Meanwhile, US Ambassador to Israel Mike Huckabee dismissed reports that <u>President Trump would abandon Israel</u> if the conflict in Gaza continued as "non-sense".

Amidst the ongoing Oman-mediated US-Iran nuclear talks, Tehran reiterated its right to <u>enrich Uranium for energy production</u>. Iran cautioned Washington that its insistence on Iran abandoning Uranium enrichment will result in failure of the negotiations. The US Special Envoy Steve Witkoff informed that he had delivered a nuclear deal proposal to Iran stressing that the US would not allow even one percent of Uranium enrichment capability in any new deal.

The <u>Termez Dialogue</u> on the Interconnectedness of Central and South Asia kicked off on May 20, under the motto "Building a Common Space of Peace, Friendship and Prosperity." The high-level forum gathered approximately 200 participants from Central and South Asia, Europe, the Commonwealth of Independent States, Asia, the United States, and the Middle East. 'Afghanistan' was a major point of discussion during the dialogue. Speaking at the opening session, head of the United Nations Assistance Mission in Afghanistan (UNAMA), <u>Roza Otunbayeva emphasised</u> the importance of constructive regional engagement in addressing the challenges facing Afghanistan. "Efforts by neighbouring countries to resolve the Afghan crisis must be recognised and supported," she stated.

On <u>May 20</u>, speaking during a high-level meeting in Tehran with Turkmenistan's Foreign Minister Rashid Meredov, Iranian President Pezeshkian emphasised that stronger ties between Tehran and Ashgabat would not only benefit both nations economically but also promote regional stability and security. Foreign Minister Meredov, who is visiting Tehran to attend the 18th meeting of the Iran-Turkmenistan Joint Economic Cooperation Commission, echoed the sentiment. He said Ashgabat views Iran as a key partner in long-term economic strategy and is committed to expanding trade corridors, improving cross-border markets, and enhancing energy transit routes.

On <u>May 18</u>, Iran and Azerbaijan launched a joint special forces exercise, weeks after Iran's president visited the neighbouring country. The "Aras-2025" exercise, running through May 21, involves Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps and Azerbaijani troops, the IRNA news agency reported. The drill was being held in areas of Karabakh previously disputed with Armenia before Azerbaijan regained control in September 2023. "This drill is a key step in boosting border security and confronting potential threats," said Brigadier General Vali Madani of the Guards' ground forces.

The 8th meeting of the India-US Joint Working Group on Aircraft Carrier Technology Cooperation (JWGACTC) <u>was held</u> in India from May 13 to 16, 2025, marking a decade of collaborative engagement under the India–US Defence Technology and Trade Initiative (DTTI). Both sides acknowledged the significant progress made by the Joint Working Group in facilitating valuable information exchange on aircraft carrier technology. During the meeting, plans for future cooperation under various aspects of aircraft carrier technology were discussed. The six-member US delegation also visited Goa, where they engaged in professional interactions with the Indian Navy's aviation specialists, focusing on operational and technical aspects of aircraft carriers. The JWGACTC, established in 2012, has played a pivotal role in codeveloping and co-producing advanced defence technology, particularly in naval aviation.

On May 16, the Israeli military announced it had <u>conducted airstrikes</u> on the Yemeni Red Sea ports of Hodeidah and as-Salif in retaliation for a renewed barrage of missiles launched by Houthi rebels toward Israel. According to a statement from the Israeli Defense Forces (IDF), the strikes targeted what they described as "terrorist infrastructure" at the two ports, which Israel alleges the Houthis have used to transfer weapons. This escalation follows a recent USbrokered ceasefire, under which the Houthis had agreed to halt attacks on international shipping, prompting the US to pause its own military operations in Yemen. Despite this agreement, the Houthis declared they would continue their attacks against Israel.

India's Permanent Representative Parvathaneni Harish highlighted that maritime security and countering terrorism are central to its national and economic interests in the Indo-Pacific



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
