

Cabinet approves SBP Amend 2021 related three bills: Hafeez

These bills were aimed at granting autonomy to the central bank, abolishing corporate income tax bill for fetching tax revenues up to Rs140 billion and fixing cash bleeding state-owned enterprises (SOEs) bill under the IMF programme.

US blocks delivery of Turkish gunships to Pakistan

The United States has prevented Turkey from supplying 30 locally-made attack helicopters to Pakistan. According to Bloomberg News, Turkey's presidential spokesman Ibrahim Kalin told reporters that "the US has blocked Turkey's helicopter sale to Pakistan, which will likely lead to Islamabad buying it from China."

Pakistan to facilitate Uzbek access to Gwadar, Karachi ports

Prime Minister Imran Khan said Pakistan would facilitate Uzbekistan to get access to its seaports of Gwadar and Karachi in a bid to enhance regional connectivity and trade. In a meeting with Uzbekistan's Foreign Minister Abdlaziz Kamilov here at the PM House, the prime minister said Pakistan offered a shortest route to international seas to all Central Asian Republics including Uzbekistan and could prove as a gateway to landlocked Central Asia.

Pakistan has only Chinese vaccine to deal with Covid-19's third phase

As the pandemic threatens Pakistan with the third phase, the government has so far received COVID-19 vaccine only from China. It has not procured yet anything from the open market and is now awaiting more vaccines from the COVAX Facility, but it has not made any bilateral agreement with India in this regard.

Hong Kong: China approves 'patriotic' plan to control elections

China's legislature has approved a resolution to overhaul Hong Kong's electoral system - its latest move to tighten control over the city. The "patriots governing Hong Kong" resolution was passed at the National People's Congress (NPC) on Thursday. It will reduce democratic representation and allow a pro-Beijing panel to vet and elect candidates. The former British colony was handed back to China in 1997 under a model called "one country, two systems".

Academic faces Chinese lawsuit for exposing human rights abuses in Xinjiang

Beijing has targeted a high-profile U.S.-based researcher whose work has been critical to exposing human rights abuses in China's northwest, with state media reporting he is being sued by companies in the Xinjiang region. In a telephone interview from his home in Minnesota on Tuesday night, Adrian Zenz said he believed the lawsuit was a sign that U.S. economic sanctions on the region were having a significant effect. He said Beijing was probably seeking to create a chilling effect on other researchers doing similar work.

China has breached all provisions of UN Genocide Convention in Xinjiang: Report

The Chinese government's actions against Uyghurs in Xinjiang have breached every provision of the UN Genocide Convention, according to a new report by more than 50 experts in international law, genocide and war crimes. Azeem Ibrahim, co-author of the report released on Tuesday by Washington-based think tank Newlines Institute for Strategy and Policy, said there is overwhelming evidence to support the allegation of genocide.

The Woke Chinese Communist Party

Note the use of "white supremacy" and "diversity" and "civilization superiority," which come straight from the

progressive critique of America as a country that is "systemically" racist and oppressive.

Xi Jinping's Eager-to-Please Bureaucrats Snarl His China Plans

After Chinese leader Xi Jinping ordered rural poverty eliminated by 2020, bureaucrats in the southwestern city of Mianyang got busy—with paperwork. Instructed to devote 70% of their time to the campaign, they diligently filled out forms certifying compliance, a practice known as "leaving marks," said Pang Jia, a local judicial clerk who joined the effort. When higher-ups demanded photographic proof of their home visits, some aid workers made up for missing winter photos by posing in cold-weather clothing during summer house calls, Ms. Pang said.

China, US could engage in multi-faceted, multi-tiered dialogue, says Chinese Premier ahead of Alaska talks

Uzbek, Kyrgyz Leaders 'Agree' To Solve Border Issues In Three Months

Uzbek President Shavkat Mirziyoev says he has agreed with visiting Kyrgyz President Sadyr Japarov on how to proceed to solve border issues between the two Central Asian nations within three months. "For the first time in relations between our two nations we have agreed who should do what and when at the border because this is a serious problem that our people are waiting to be fixed," Mirziyoev said on March 12 after holding talks with his Kyrgyz counterpart in Tashkent.
