

Rajnath Singh Briefs Sharad Pawar, AK Antony On China Border Row

Qureshi and I had a call to underscore our desire for a stable and sustainable bilateral relationship".

15pc salary increase for military personnel approved

The cabinet approved 15 per cent increase in the salary of military personnel, which is in addition to 10pc raise announced in the federal budget. In another significant development, the cabinet endorsed the ban on Tehreek-i-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP).

9 Chinese, 4 Pakistanis killed in Dasu bus tragedy

Thirteen people, including nine Chinese nationals, two personnel of the Frontier Constabulary (FC) and two locals, were killed and 28 others sustained injuries when a coach carrying them to an under-construction tunnel site of the 4,300-megawatt Dasu hydropower project fell into a ravine in the Upper Kohistan area after an explosion.

New roadmap for ties with US being finalised, Senate body told

The Senate Committee on Defence and National Security was informed that a new roadmap for broad-based ties with the United States was being finalised. National Security Adviser Dr Moeed Yusuf, while briefing the committee, said an effort was being made to expand the ties from just being Afghanistan specific.

Pakistan, Uzbekistan agree to finalise Preferential Trade Agreement

Pakistan and Uzbekistan agreed to finalise bilateral Preferential Trade Agreement (PTA) within three months to further boost bilateral trade volume. At the 6th meeting of the Uzbek-Pakistani Intergovernmental Commission on Trade-Economic and Scientific-Technical Cooperation (IGC) held in Tashkent, both sides agreed to form joint working groups on agriculture, information technology, education and mineral sectors to boost cooperation, said a news release issued here.

Govt won't let Afghan refugees reach cities this time

Information Minister Fawad Chaudhry said Pakistan was keenly monitoring the fast changing situation in Afghanistan and making all out efforts for an all-encompassing government in Kabul. Speaking at a joint press conference with Adviser to the Prime Minister on Accountability Mirza Shahzad Akbar and Minister for Energy Hammad Azhar, he said that in case the Afghans sought refuge in Pakistan, the government would not allow them to sneak into cities

and would confine them to refugee camps to be established in the Pak-Afghan border areas.

Traces of explosives found on Dasu bus, blast site: govt

Stepping back from its earlier position that the blast on Chinese workers' bus was caused by accidental leakage of gas, the government said it could potentially be a terrorism incident as traces of explosives had been detected on the wreckage of the bus and at the blast site.

Terms of accord for gas pipeline signed with Russia

After four days of negotiations, Pakistan and Russia signed Heads of Terms (HoTs) of shareholders' agreement for construction of about 1,100km gas pipeline from Port Qasim in Karachi to Lahore at an estimated cost of \$2.5-3 billion by the end of 2023.

CPEC Authority includes six key projects of KP

The China Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) Authority has included 6 key projects of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa in the upcoming meeting of Joint Cooperation Committee (JCC) of CPEC. However, the KP government has sent a request to the chairman of CPEC Authority to include nine additional projects in the CPEC portfolio.

China postpones JCC meeting

The meeting of Joint Cooperation Committee – the strategic brain of the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor – was abruptly postponed, underscoring the challenges that both the nations have to face due to changing regional security situation. The decision to postpone the meeting was taken a day after nine Chinese and five Pakistani nationals were killed in an accident, which Chinese authorities have described as a bomb attack but Pakistan initially termed it a vehicle failure.

PM Imran assures Chinese counterpart of thorough investigation in Dasu incident

Prime Minister Imran Khan assured his Chinese counterpart Li Keqiang that 'no effort' will be spared to 'fully investigate' the Kohistan bus incident that claimed the lives of nine Chinese nationals. "He [prime minister] assured that no effort

would be spared to fully investigate the incident," said a statement from the Prime Minister's Office detailing the telephone call between the two premiers.

US never asked for military bases in Pakistan: Western diplomats

The United States has "at no stage or at any level even asked" Pakistan for military bases in the wake of withdrawal of its forces from Afghanistan, a senior Western diplomat has said. "Nobody in the entire US administration asked for bases, and yet there is so much focus on the issue in Pakistan," said the official, who was speaking on condition of anonymity because he is not authorised to speak publicly on the subject.

Pakistan deputes envoys in China to lure investors

Pakistan has deputed new counselors in China to promote foreign investment in industrialisation under the second phase of the latter-financed economic projects in the south Asian economy.

UK could work with Taliban in Afghan govt: defence secretary

UK Defence Secretary Ben Wallace said Britain will work with the Taliban if they entered into a power-sharing government in Afghanistan and respected human rights. "Whatever the government of the day is, provided it adheres to certain international norms, the UK government will engage with it," he told the Daily Telegraph.

Gen Miller hands over command to Afghan govt

July 13, 2021, The News

General Austin Scott Miller — the top US general in Afghanistan — relinquished command and handed it over to the Afghan government at an official ceremony in the capital. In a simple ceremony, General Miller handed over his duties to two US generals — one who will oversee US military action from Central Command headquarters in Florida, and one who will command the roughly 650 troops to remain after the official US withdrawal, reports the international media.

Taliban ask Turkey to leave Afghanistan

The Taliban called on Turkey to withdraw its troops from Afghanistan like the other NATO countries. Suhail Shaheen, the Taliban's spokesman, said as a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (Nato), Turkey must withdraw its forces from Afghanistan in accordance with the agreement signed with the United States on February 29, 2020.

Ismail Khan mobilises hundreds in Herat to fight Taliban

Mohammad Ismail Khan, a former mujahideen leader and a senior member of Jamiat-e-Islami party, has mobilized hundreds of his loyalists in Herat province in the west of Afghanistan to fight the Taliban as the group continues to capture large swaths of territories across the country.

Afghan govt claims recapture of border crossing opposite Chaman

Afghan security forces have retaken control of a major southern border crossing with Pakistan that the Taliban briefly captured, a senior Afghan government official said, but the Taliban dismissed that saying they still held the town.

Kandahar Airstrike 'Aborted' Over Pakistan's Warning: Sources

Operation by three A29 aircraft of the Afghan Air Force on Taliban targets in Spin Boldak, Kandahar, on July 15, was aborted after "receiving warning" from Pakistan's forces. A copy of the conversation which was sent to TOLO news by government sources shows that Afghan Air Force was warned that they are getting "closer to the border," but an Afghan military official claims that they were warned not to get closer as much as 18 kilometers to the international border point in Chaman and Spin Boldak.

Indian Journalist Killed in Clashes in Afghanistan

Danish Siddiqui, a Reuters photojournalist, was killed during clashes in Spin Boldak district in Kandahar. The Indian journalist was covering the situation in Kandahar over the last few days.

Russia Opposes Possible US Military Deployment in Central Asia

Russia stated its opposition to a possible plan by the United States to deploy its troops in Central Asia countries once it pulls out its troops from Afghanistan on August 31, which will also mark the end of two decades of military engagement in Afghanistan. Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov said that the presence of over 100,000 US and NATO forces in Afghanistan in the past decades did not result in a victory for the US in Afghanistan, and questioned what the US wants to achieve by deploying fewer numbers of troops outside.

Indian Govt: Consulate in Kandahar Not Closed
