China heightens activity along LAC in Uttarakhand, Indian Army on alert

According to an official release, the foreign secretary will discuss a host of issues with his counterparts in the UK, including the implementation of the said roadmap and the evolving situation in Afghanistan.

Jaishankar pitches for connectivity with Afghanistan via Chabahar, takes jibe at China, Pakistan

External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar made a strong pitch for connectivity with Afghanistan by leveraging the role of Iran's Chabahar Port, which will act as a hub for the joint use of India, Uzbekistan, Iran and Afghanistan. Speaking at the International Conference on Regional Connectivity of Central and South Asia, at the Uzbekistan capital of Tashkent, Jaishankar stressed that any form of connectivity efforts made by countries should adhere to international laws, territorial integrity and sovereignty, and that such initiatives should not create "debt burdens".

Afghan peace conference postponed: Foreign Office

Pakistan Ministry of Foreign Affairs said the Afghan Peace Conference being hosted by Pakistan had been postponed. "The new dates of the said conference will be announced later,". The conference was postponed after President Ashraf Ghani, reportedly in his meeting with Prime Minister Imran Khan, called for its cancellation. President Ghani, while speaking at a regional connectivity conference in Uzbekistan, also bitterly criticised Pakistan for its alleged support of Afghan Taliban.

Beijing asks Islamabad to punish elements involved in bus blast

China asked Pakistan to punish perpetrators of the attack on Chinese workers' bus in Dasu and increase the security of Chinese citizens and organisations working in Pakistan. The demand was made by Chinese Premier Li Keqiang in a telephone call with Prime Minister Imran Khan as a group of Chinese officials arrived in Pakistan to investigate the incident and coordinate the repatriation of the dead and the injured.

Chinese team wraps up probe into Dasu tragedy

Pakistan Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi visited the Combined Military Hospital (CMH) in Rawalpindi to inquire after the health of the Chinese

workers who were injured in last week's Dasu bus blast as the Chinese investigation team completed its initial task at the site.

Kabul recalls ambassador, diplomats from Islamabad

Afghanistan called back its ambassador and senior diplomats from Pakistan after the reported abduction and release of the Afghan envoy's daughter in the federal capital.

US urges tangible steps for supporting Afghan peace process

The United States emphasised the need for "tangible steps" for supporting the Afghan peace process. The call was made at the end of US Special Representative for Afghanistan Reconciliation Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad's visit to Islamabad during which he met Prime Minister Imran Khan and Chief of the Army Staff General Qamar Bajwa.

Food import bill surges by over 53pc

Pakistan's food import bill grew by 53.91 per cent to \$8.347 billion year-on-year during the previous fiscal year (FY21), mainly due to sugar, wheat, palm oil and pulses imports to bridge the shortfall in domestic production of agriculture produce. The rising food import bill also triggered trade deficit that may cause some uneasiness on the external side for the government.

Senate passes FATF-related bill amid opposition protest

The Senate passed another FATF-related bill amid an outcry from the opposition which suffered back-to-back defeats in the house where it otherwise enjoys dominating numerical strength.

Export of textiles soars to \$15.4bn in FY21

Pakistan's exports of textile and clothing posted a 22.94 per cent growth in the outgoing financial year compared to the same period a year ago. In absolute terms, the total exports of textile and clothing were \$15.4 billion in 2020-21 against \$12.526bn of the previous year.

Pakistan, Uzbekistan agree to acquire leased lands for export cargoes

Pakistan and Uzbekistan are planning to acquire leased lands on each other's countries, a measure the government says will help boost exports to untapped markets. Abdul Razzak Dawood, advisor to the Prime Minister on commerce and trade said Uzbekistan has asked for 25 acres of land on lease in Karachi or Gwadar to store and ship their cargoes for South East Asian and the Middle Eastern countries.

FM Qureshi leaves for China on two-day visit

Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi will be visiting China as part of the high-level exchanges between the two countries, the Foreign Office has said. "On the invitation of the State Councilor and Foreign Minister Mr Wang Yi, Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi will visit China from 23-24 July 2021".

Russia says Taliban ready for 'compromise'

Russia to reinforce military base in Tajikistan - report

Afghan rivals agree to meet again after inconclusive Doha talks

<u>Russia, Tajikistan, Uzbekistan To Hold Military Maneuvers Near Afghan Border</u> <u>In August</u>

Russia, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan will hold joint military maneuvers near the Tajik-Afghan border in early August amid increasing security concerns in Central Asian nations over Taliban offensives against government troops in northern Afghanistan. The commander of Russia's Central Military District, Aleksandr Lapin, said that the drills will be held on Tajikistan's Harb-Maidon military field on August 5-10.

Turkmenistan Continues Military Buildup Near Border Amid Deteriorating Afghan Security

Turkmenistan continues to send heavy weaponry, helicopters, and other aircraft to areas along the Turkmen-Afghan border to allay security fears as Taliban fighters engage in major offensives nearby in northern Afghanistan. Eighteen Military Personnel Die In Turkmenistan, Circumstances Unclear

Massive Mudslides Kill At Least 10 In Tajikistan

Massive mudslides caused by heavy rains have killed at least 10 people, including four children, in Tajikistan's northwestern district of Pejikent. Officials at the Emergency Ministry said that the mudslides hit the villages of Dashti Kozi and Kishtudak late on July 19, with rescue and recovery operations running through July 20.

Kazakhstan: Activists tracked by Pegasus angered but not surprised

Activists in Kazakhstan tracked by the Israeli surveillance firm NSO Group, apparently at the behest of their country's authoritarian government, have expressed indignation but little surprise that they too have been targeted for snooping. In a more surprising turn of events, however, it appears that the communications of the uppermost layers of the country's elite – including men who would go on to become president and prime minister – have been surveilled as well.

Despite Taliban Advances, Central Asia Eyes Trade Ties With South Asia

Central Asia has long advertised itself as the crossroads of the Eurasian continent -- a region that, with development, could be an important transit hub for shipping goods from east to west and from north to south. Judging by the attendance at a July 15-16 conference in Tashkent, regional players still see potential in the proposed routes.

OPEC+ Agrees to Boost Oil Output After Saudi Arabia, UAE End Standoff

OPEC will boost output by as much as 400,000 barrels a day each month from August until all of its halted output has been revived, delegates said. The deal will also give the UAE, Iraq and Kuwait higher output quotas from May 2022.
