

India in chair, UNSC adopts resolution on Taliban; Russia and China abstain

The resolution, sponsored by France, UK and the US, was adopted with 13 members, including India, voting in favour, none against it. But permanent and veto-wielding members Russia and China abstained.

India surges ahead of China in the Maldives

Built by Hindustan Shipyard in collaboration with Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) and National Technical Research Organisation (NTRO), INS Dhruv has the capability to also map ocean beds for research and detection of enemy submarines.

India-Africa Maritime Cooperation: Naval exercises for the first time with Morocco and Algeria

Two more aircraft of the series equipped with the latest weapons and sensors to undertake Maritime Air Operations have also been contracted by Pakistan Navy.

UK Foreign Secretary to visit Pakistan

The UK Foreign Secretary Dominic Raab will be visiting Pakistan to hold high level talks with Pakistani officials against the backdrop of the Taliban takeover of Afghanistan. Officials of Pakistan and the UK spoke to finalise the visit of Dominic Raab as the Foreign Secretary has been under intense fire for not being on the scene as Kabul fell and thousands of Britons were left stranded as the government of Ashraf Ghani collapsed.

External debt, liabilities climb to \$122.1bln in FY21

Pakistan's foreign debt and liabilities (outstanding) jumped by \$9.18 billion or 8.12 percent to \$122.1 billion at the end of June last fiscal year. The external debt

and liabilities (EDL) were \$113 billion as of June 30, 2020. The foreign debt and liabilities were 40.3 percent of the country's gross domestic product in fiscal 2020/21, lower than the prior fiscal year's 45.7 percent.

Kyrgyzstan: Activists complain of mass wiretapping campaign

Not To Be Left Out, Uzbek Lawmakers Pitch 'Head Of Nation' Title For Mirziyoev
