

India

<u>China officially admits five military officers, soldiers killed in clash with Indian</u> <u>Army in Galwan</u>

A total of 20 Indian soldiers died in the Galwan Valley clash, regarded as the worst in over four decades at the India-China border. 'Pakistan not to allow duty-free cotton from India'

Pakistan will not allow import of duty-free cotton from India in order to bridge the shortfall in the local market, Adviser to Prime Minister on Commerce Razak Dawood said. Pakistan's cotton production fell 34 percent during the current fiscal year and the government left with no other option but to import cotton for meeting domestic requirements of the country.

Accord reached with IMF for release of \$500m

Fire 'catastrophe' destroys hundreds of fuel tankers on Afghanistan-Iran border

Hundreds of oil and gas tankers were destroyed by fire in a "catastrophe" at Afghanistan's biggest trade crossing with Iran, causing millions of dollars of losses. The huge blaze, which broke out at Islam Qala port, 120 kilometres from the western city of Herat, has been contained and an investigation launched into its cause.

Army holding war games to validate concept of defence in desert: ISPR

Pakistan Army said that its troops are holding war games in the Thar desert. The exercises codenamed 'Jidar-ul-Hadeed' that began on Jan 28, the ISPR said, would conclude on Feb 28. Troops assigned to Karachi Corps are taking part in the drills. The troops are "practising tactical drills and procedures" as part of the exercises.

Taliban have no authority to decide cases in Pakistan: SC

The Supreme Court has held that the Taliban had no legal authority to decide cases and their decision was not applicable to Pakistan, which was a sovereign country, the applicable law of which applied to every inch of its territory. The judgement was issued by a two-judge SC bench consisting of Justice Qazi Faez Isa and Justice Maqbool Baqar on a petition filed by Gul Nawaz and others against the 2019 Peshawar High Court order in a land dispute case.

Afghanistan

PIA chief seeks more flights to Kabul

The PIA CEO requested Afghanistan's Civil Aviation Authority to allow increase in the airline's flights to Kabul and approve its flights from Kandahar and Mazar-i-Sharif to further strengthen ties between the two countries.

Germany says troops may stay longer in Afghanistan

Germany's military deployment in Afghanistan as part of NATO should be extended beyond its expiration date in March, according to Foreign Minister Heiko Maas. Maas called for a new parliamentary mandate in order to be prepared for "different scenarios."

Taliban Controls 52% of Territory in Afghanistan: Survey

A survey by an Afghan news agency shows that the Taliban controls at least 52 percent of the country's territory while 59 percent of the population lives in areas under the government's control. The survey conducted by Pajhwok Afghan News shows that the Afghan government controls 46 percent of the territory. The survey was conducted between November 30 to February 3.

Taleban fighters close in on Afghan cities, pushing the country to the brink

Hong Kong's Freedoms: What China Promised and How It's Cracking Down

Beijing imposed a national security law in 2020 that gave it broad new powers to punish critics and silence dissenters and could fundamentally alter life for Hong Kongers.

China played leading role in spreading Covid-19 conspiracies, investigation finds

It took just three months for the rumour that Covid-19 was engineered as a bioweapon to spread from the fringes of the Chinese internet and take root in millions of people's minds. By March 2020, belief that the virus had been human-made and possibly weaponised was widespread, multiple surveys indicated. As the pandemic swept the world, it was China – not Russia – that took the lead in spreading foreign disinformation about Covid-19's origins.

Japan protests intrusion by Chinese ships in waters near Senkakus

Japan lodged a protest Monday over an intrusion by Chinese vessels in waters near the Senkaku Islands, urging them to promptly leave the area, the government's top spokesman said. The Japan-administered islands are claimed by China, which calls them Diaoyu.

U.S. consults Japan, S Korea on N Korea policy

Indonesian MCMVs Make Sweeping Progress

A \$204 million contract for the 62m-long ships was concluded in January 2019, and a steel-cutting ceremony was held on 26 November 2020. Featuring a nonmagnetic steel hull, the MCMV design is based on the Frankenthal class operated by the German Navy. Once commissioned, they will allow retirement of the navy's two Pulau Rengat-class minehunters built in the Netherlands. These entered service in March 1988, so they are already long in the tooth.

EAM Jaishankar Pitches for Connectivity from Arabian Sea to South China Sea

India's external affairs minister Dr S Jaishankar has pitched for connectivity from "Arabian Sea to South China Sea" even as New Delhi and Tokyo work together in tandem.
