

India, France to hold naval drills

US Hands Over Hundreds of Vehicles to Afghan Security Forces

German charged with passing parliament floor plans to Russia

The suspect, identified only as Jens F. in line with German privacy rules, worked for a company that had been repeatedly contracted to check portable electrical appliances by the Bundestag, or the lower house of parliament, federal prosecutors said in a statement.

Russian Imprisoned for Handing 'State Secrets' to China

A Russian national has been sentenced to 8 years in prison for treason by handing state secrets to China, a court in Siberia announced. Vladimir Vasilyev, 52, had pleaded guilty to passing state secrets to China's intelligence services, the state-run TASS news agency quoted an unnamed law enforcement source as saying. He is at least the third Russian citizen to be convicted of state treason this year and the 10th in the past two years.

New EU sanctions against Russia to be approved next week

New EU sanctions against Russia due to the situation around Alexey Navalny will be officially approved next week, President of the European Council Charles Michel said at a press conference following the first day of the EU online summit.
