

Outage plunges country into darkness

Keep tariffs on China, says outgoing US trade chief

In an interview with The Wall Street Journal, US Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer defended the Trump administration's tactics of slapping tariffs on hundreds of billions of dollars in Chinese goods starting in 2018. "We changed the way people think about China," said Lighthizer, architect of the tariff policy that he argues benefited American workers, even though some economists disagree.

China's new rules amp up pressure on US businesses
