

India unveils new defence budget aimed at promoting a self-reliant industry

India announced its new defence budget Tuesday that will see \$13.84 billion go toward promoting self-reliance among local businesses and reducing the country's import dependency under its \$22.26 billion fund for acquisitions of new weapons and military platforms.

Indian Navy's 5th Scorpène Submarine "Vagir" Begins Sea Trials

The fifth submarine of Project 75, Yard 11879, Indian Navy's Kalvari class commenced her sea trials on 01 February 2022. The submarine was launched in November 2020 from the Kanhoji Angre Wet Basin of Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Limited (MDL). The submarine would be named Vagir, after commissioning.

#### Gwadar rights leader warns of long march

Maulana Hidayatur Rehman, who led the 'Gwadar Ko Haque Do' movement — an over month-long protest sit-in demanding rights for the port city — has warned the Balochistan government that if the accord the government signed with him and other leaders of the movement for ending the sit-in is not implemented, they would organise a long march against it in Quetta.

## US delaying approval of Masood Khan's appointment as Pakistan envoy

The State Department has been taking unusually long to process the agreement of Pakistan's ambassador-designate to the United States, Masood Khan. The delay has triggered an impression of a pause in the process.

#### NSA meets senior Taliban officials during Kabul visit

Pakistan National Security Adviser Dr Moeed Yusuf held talks with senior Taliban officials in Kabul on bilateral ties. Dr Yusuf, who was leading an interministerial delegation, kicked off the trip with a meeting with Taliban regime's acting Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi. He is the second ministerial-level government functionary to have visited Kabul since the Taliban took over Afghanistan in August last year, as earlier Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi had visited the country in October.

## Priest gunned down after mass

A Christian priest was shot dead and another wounded when unidentified attackers fired on their vehicle near Jamil Chowk on Peshawar's Ring Road. The victim, Kohati gate-resident William Siraj, was a retired schoolteacher and priest at a church in the Chamkani area.

#### 10 killed as violence revisits Balochistan

January 29, 2022, The News

At least 10 people were slain and several others sustained injuries in multiple incidents across Balochistan as terrorism revisited the province. Four people, including Senator Sarfaraz Bugti's cousin, were martyred while 10 others were injured during a landmine blast in Dera Bugti.

CPEC projects: 11,225 security personnel deployed in Punjab to protect Chinese nationals

Punjab home department has deployed 11,225 security personnel in the province for protecting Chinese nationals working on different projects. These security personnel from army, Rangers, Special Protection Unit (SPU), Special Branch representatives, police, departmental security, PS GS were deployed for the protection of 3355 Chinese nationals working on CPEC projects and non-CPEC projects.

Taliban close to international recognition, claims foreign minister

The Taliban are inching closer towards international recognition but any concessions Afghanistan's new rulers make will be on their terms, the regime's foreign minister said in an interview.

Taliban killed 100 ex-Afghan govt officials, others: UN

The Taliban and their allies have killed more than 100 security and civilian personnel linked to the former US-backed Afghan government since seizing power in August, according to a new United Nations report.

## TAPI project to begin in near future: Islamic Emirate

The Islamic Emirate says that the practical work of the TAPI project will begin in the near future and all the preliminary work has been prepared for its implementation. Bilal Karimi, the deputy spokesman for the Islamic Emirate, said that work on the security and financial sectors of the project has been partially completed and that practical work on the project will begin as the weather warms up.

## Afghan universities reopen with trickle of women attending

Some public universities opened in Afghanistan for the first time since the Taliban seized power in August, with a trickle of women attending classes that officials said would be segregated by sex. Most secondary schools for girls and all public universities were shuttered when Taliban stormed back to power, sparking fears women would again be barred from education -- as happened during the Taliban's first rule, from 1996-2001.

#### US gives global banks the OK to transfer aid funds to Afghanistan

International banks can transfer money to Afghanistan for humanitarian purposes, and aid groups are allowed to pay teachers and healthcare workers at state-run institutions without fear of breaching sanctions on the Taliban, the United States said. The US Department of the Treasury offered guidance on sanctions exemptions issued in September and December for humanitarian work in Afghanistan, where the United Nations says more than half the country's 39 million people suffer extreme hunger and the economy, education and social services are facing collapse.

## Indian plan to send wheat to Afghanistan back on track, shipment begins next week

The shipping of 50,000 tonnes of wheat offered by India as humanitarian assistance to the Afghan people via Pakistani land routes is expected to begin next week, Afghan ambassador Farid Mamundzay said.

## China's Unspoken Winter Olympics Theme: 'We're Here, Get Used to It'

As host of the Winter Games, which open Friday, China is now a recognized superpower less interested in global validation and a lot less likely to get it. This time, nobody thinks the Olympics will change China. Beijing is at odds with major trading partners over human rights. Multinational corporations that proudly aligned themselves with China in the previous Games are keeping a low profile.

## China Fortifies Its Borders With a 'Southern Great Wall,' Citing Covid-19

An extensive buildup of barriers along China's 3,000-mile southern border is under way, according to public documents, official statements and interviews with residents, ostensibly to battle Covid-19 but with likely long-lasting ramifications on trade and travel. It is a border fence equipped with barbed wire, surveillance cameras and sensors.

#### China's Economy Is Heading Toward Stagnation, Not Collapse

## Taiwan Can't Wait

In March 2021, Admiral Philip S. Davidson, then the commander of U.S. Indo-Pacific Command, informed Congress that China could invade Taiwan within the next six years. In October, Taiwanese Defense Minister Chiu Kuo-cheng gave an even shorter timeline, asserting that China would be capable of a "full-scale invasion" by 2025. And in Foreign Affairs last summer, Oriana Skylar Mastro, an expert on the People's Liberation Army (PLA), warned that "there have been disturbing signals that Beijing is reconsidering its peaceful approach and contemplating armed unification."

China, Russia are 'stabilizers for challenging world', Xi-Putin meeting to address critical issues, may ink new deals: experts

WHO chief arrives in Beijing for Winter Olympics – platform for advancing multilateral collaboration

## China says U.S. plans to pay athletes to 'sabotage' Beijing Games

China's foreign ministry and an official newspaper have accused the United States of planning to interfere with and "sabotage" the Beijing Winter Olympics by paying athletes from some countries to make half-hearted efforts in competition and to criticise China.

#### Japan

## Japan, South Korea spar over Sado gold mines' World Heritage bid

The Japanese and South Korean foreign ministers clashed Thursday over Tokyo's nomination of former gold mines for UNESCO World Heritage status despite Seoul's protests over their links to wartime labour. South Korean Foreign Minister Chung Eui-yong expressed "deep disappointment and protested against" Japan's backing of the remains of centuries-old gold and silver mines on Sado Island in Niigata Prefecture, according to the South Korean Foreign Ministry's readout of the talks.

#### Japan considers sending natural gas to Europe in contingency over Ukraine

Japan is weighing an option to divert part of its natural gas reserves to Europe in case Russia restricts gas supplies to the region in response to projected sanctions following a Russian invasion of Ukraine, government sources said Thursday. Japan is likely to seek coordination with other countries in supporting Europe, which heavily relies on natural gas supplies from Russia through pipelines.

#### <u>Japan adopts Xinjiang resolution but sidesteps criticism of China</u>

The lower house of Japan's parliament on Tuesday adopted a resolution expressing concern over Uyghur and Hong Kong human rights, just days before China opens the Beijing Winter Olympics. The statement, however, stopped short of directly criticizing China and did not even mention the

country by name. The phrase "human rights violations" in an early draft was also changed to "human rights situation" -- striking a far more cautious tone than similar resolutions from the U.S. and Europe.

## Japan to draft quidelines for corporate workforce disclosure

The Japanese government plans to create guidelines for companies to disclose "human capital" metrics such as employee diversity and human resource training as soon as this summer, Nikkei has learned. Human capital, the abilities and knowledge of workers, is seen as an asset that can generate new ideas. The U.S. and Europe lead the way in this area, and the government hopes that the disclosure of such information will help attract new investment.

## Japan's Kishida suffers 6-point drop in approval rating: Nikkei poll

The approval rating of Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida's cabinet fell 6 percentage points from December to 59% in the latest Nikkei-TV Tokyo poll, the first drop since he took office this past October. Approval of the government's pandemic response also declined. The cabinet's disapproval rating rose 4 points to 30%.

#### Korea

## Lee, Yoon at odds over US-China rivalry

South Korea's rival presidential candidates presented starkly contrasting diplomatic views during their first TV debate, Friday. Ruling Democratic Party of Korea (DPK) presidential candidate Lee Jae-myung underscored pragmatism, while main opposition People Power Party (PPP) candidate Yoon Suk-yeol vowed to restore the Korea-U.S. alliance, claiming it had weakened considerably after President Moon Jae-in stepped into office five years ago.

## Korea to export K9 howitzers to Egypt in 2 tril. won deal

Korea on Tuesday signed a contract to sell K9 self-propelled howitzers to Egypt in a deal worth over 2 trillion won (\$1.65 billion), Seoul's arms procurement agency said, marking the artillery system's first entry into the African market. Hanwha Defence, the Korean manufacturer, and Egypt's defence ministry inked the largest K9 export deal in the Artillery House, a military facility in Cairo, capping more than 10 years of on-again, off-again talks. The deal includes the

production of K9s in Egypt and a technology transfer, according to the Defence Acquisition Program Administration (DAPA).

## US focused on joint defense readiness with S. Korea: Pentagon

The United States continues to remain focused on its joint defence capabilities with South Korea and will make any related decisions through close consultation with Seoul, a Pentagon spokesperson said Wednesday. John Kirby made the remarks when asked if the US and South Korea were considering postponing joint military exercises despite a recent series of missile launches by North Korea.

#### North Korea conducts seventh suspected missile launch

North Korea launched at least one suspected ballistic missile into the sea off its east coast on Sunday, governments in the region reported, in what would be the nuclear-armed country's seventh test this month. South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff reported that a projectile believed to be a single ballistic missile was launched at around 7:52 a.m. (22:52 GMT) from North Korea's Jagang Province toward the ocean off its east coast.

## Myanmar military barred from ASEAN foreign ministers' meeting

The Association for Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) has barred Myanmar's military-appointed foreign minister from attending an upcoming meeting, after the United Nations Security Council called for an end to "all forms of violence" in the country as well as the release of detained civilian leaders, including Aung San Suu Kyi.

<u>Taliban's Arrest Of Ethnic Uzbek Commander Sparks Clashes In Northern</u>
Afghanistan

The growing animosity between Uzbek, Turkmen, and Tajik ethnic groups and the Taliban ignited briefly in Faryab's provincial capital of Maimana in mid-January when protests over the arrest of a local leader led to fighting. Makhdum Alem is an ethnic Uzbek Taliban commander in Faryab Province, which borders Turkmenistan.

Turkmenistan: The golden road to Chabahar

Experts Urge US to Update Its Central Asia Strategy
