3rd India-Japan Indo-Pacific Forum (6th India-Japan Track 1.5 Dialogue) "Bridging the Indo-Pacific"

Date: November 18, 2020

Event Profile

The Delhi Policy Group (DPG) and the Japan Institute of International Affairs (JIIA) as mandated anchor institutions will jointly organise the 3rd annual India-Japan Indo-Pacific Forum (6th India-Japan Track 1.5 Dialogue) on November 18, 2020. Owing to the restrictions on travel necessitated by the coronavirus pandemic, this year's Forum will be held virtually.

Over the past five years, DPG-JIIA Track 1.5 dialogues have aimed to improve strategic communication between India and Japan, two trusted partners with shared values and interests that have the potential of making major contributions to Asia's future. Following the direction of the two Prime Ministers at their annual summit in 2017 encouraging regular interactions among senior officials and think-tanks, DPG and JIIA developed an updated concept for an expanded Track 1.5 Dialogue, which was fittingly renamed the India-Japan Indo-Pacific Forum in 2018.

The inaugural Indo-Pacific Forum was held in New Delhi in October, 2018. It called upon India and Japan to "assume greater regional responsibilities as Asia's leading maritime democracies to...mitigate unilateral assertions and help sustain peace, stability and prosperity in the Indo-Pacific."

The second Indo-Pacific Forum was held in Tokyo in October, 2019 focused on "Navigating the Great Power Rivalry" and strengthening the contributions of India and Japan to a Free and Open Indo-Pacific. The Forum deliberated concrete proposals for enhanced India-Japan Security Cooperation and assessed prospects for Third Country cooperation in the Indo-Pacific. Discussions were also held on Digital Connectivity cooperation between the two countries in the midst of growing digital competition. To increase public awareness about the importance of India-Japan partnership, the deliberations concluded in a Public Forum attended by diplomats, academics and students.





Since the last meeting of the Forum, there have been extraordinary shifts and strains in the international order. These have included a "Black Swan" Coronavirus-19 pandemic which triggered global lockdowns, pushing the world into its worst economic crisis in decades. We are also witnessing an intensification of great power competition and growing unilateral assertions of coercive power that undermine the international rule of law. This has created a major strategic imbalance in the Indo-Pacific, highlighting the importance of regional security architecture to shape rules-based behaviour of states, including the India-Japan-Australia-US security dialogue framework known as the Quad. The pandemic has also underscored the importance of secure and resilient supply chains and the need for reformed multilateralism, to prevent any actor from dictating the global economic agenda and undermining existing multilateral institutions.

These developments largely dictate the agenda for the upcoming Forum which will focus on Global Order and the Indo-Pacific (Session I), India-Japan Bilateral Relations (Session II) and Economic Cooperation, Investment and Trade (Session III). Session I and II will be closed-door and governed by the Chatham House Rule. Session III will be a public session, which will be live-streamed via social media.
